

1. AIDS Committee of Ottawa 19 Main St.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED The AIDS Committee of Ottawa (ACO) has served the HIV/AIDS community for over 30 years, providing education and support services. The home of the ACO features a drop-in centre known as the Living Room. W, A, P, F, B, T, OCT.

2. Algonquin College **DARE** District



1385 Woodroffe Ave., Building C Sat. CLOSED/Sun. 10 am to 4 pm A place for Discovery, Applied Research, and Entrepreneurship. Experience virtual reality demos, 3D printed artifacts, and more in this new, uniquely designed centre home to a new Indigenous Learning Commons, an Outdoor Gathering Circle, and an Institute for Indigenization. W, A, P, F, B, OCT.

3. All Saints Anglican Church, Greely 7103 Parkway Rd.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED Built in 1889, on land donated by Richard Stanley, All Saints Greely was dedicated in honour of those saintly persons who have no special day in the year. This small church has 10 stained glass windows and 16 benches for a congregation of 75 parishioners. W, A, P, F, B, T.

4. allsaints event space **315 Chapel Street** Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

Once the site of Canada's only royal wedding and parish of many prominent Canadians, allsaints was purchased by a partnership of businesses and residents. The multi-purpose space features stunning WWI memorial stained glass windows, beautifully repointed stone, and a rare nine-bell chime in the tower. W. A. F, B, T, S, OCT.

5. Bank of Canada 234 Wellington St. Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED

The Bank of Canada's head office combines classic and modern architecture. Tour the striking garden atrium, a typical meeting room and the art deco marble lobby of the original Centre block building. The Bank of Canada Museum will also offer interactive exhibitions. Visit bankofcanada.ca/doors-open for information. W, A, F, S, OCT.

Barber - Carving & Sculpture Inc. 1520 Triole St. Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

Visit the 800-square-foot sculpting studio used for drawing, clay modelling and

used for drawing, clay modelling and plaster casting. The studio is equipped with carving stations for employees and students enrolled in carving classes. Most commissions are for larger projects, such as the restoration of West Block on Parliament Hill. W, A, P, F, B, T, OCT.

7. Barry Padolsky Associates Inc. Architects, Mercury Court Building

377 Dalhousie St., Suite 202 Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED Originally built in 1923 as Larocque's Department Store, Mercury Court was renovated and expanded by Barry Padolsky Associates Inc. Architects from 1989 to 1993; it is now home to this architectural firm. Features include the "Flying Mercury" weathervane, which adorned the Sun Life Building until 1949. W, A, F, \$P, S, OCT.

8. Bayview Yards 7 Bayview Rd. Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED

The former City of Ottawa Workshops Building #4 at Bayview Yards is a heritage designated, circa 1941, industrial building. The retrofit and upgrade of the building is an adaptive reuse with elements of preservation and restoration, described as an unadorned example of a Modern Style industrial building. W, A, P, F, B, T, S, OCT.

Beckta Dining & Wine Bar – The Grant House 150 Elgin St., Unit 100 Sat. 10 am to 2 pm/Sun. CLOSED

Beckta is a landmark fine dining restaurant that relocated to the historic Grant House in 2014. The building has a heritage designation for both the interior and exterior, and was the home and workplace of Dr. James Grant, Canada's first Surgeon General. W, A, P, F, B, \$P, T, S, OCT.



Ben Franklin Place - Meridian Theatres @ Centrepointe, #11

10. Beechwood Cemetery 280 Beechwood Ave. Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 3 pm

Founded in 1873, Beechwood was designated a National Historic Site in 2001 because of its key role in Canadian heritage. Over 400 famous burials reside on the grounds. Please meet in front of the Beechwood Mausoleum. Tours are available as follows:

- Mausoleum Sat. & Sun., 10 am to 3 pm
- National Memorial Centre and Hall of Colours – Sun. only, 10 am to 12 pm
- Historical walking tours -Sat. 10:30 am (History of Ottawa including mayors) and 1:30 pm (General History of Beechwood) (90 min. per tour).

11. Ben Franklin Place - Meridian Theatres @ Centrepointe 101 Centrepointe Dr.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm / Sun. CLOSED Opened in May 1988, the theatre is owned and operated by the City of Ottawa. It offers community programming, and provides a venue for commercial promoters and local groups like Orpheus, Les Petits Ballets, and Suzart Productions. Members of Orpheus will be on hand to give an insider's view of their production, Priscilla, Queen of the Desert. W, A, P, F, B, T, OCT.

Billings Estate Artefact Collection Storage Guigues St.

Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

Explore behind the scenes of the Billings Estate National Historic Site artefact collection, listen to the stories these trea-

sures tell, and learn how the City cares for historic artefacts. Investigate an object and see what secrets it can unlock! W, A, P, F, B, T, S, OCT.

13. Billings Estate National Historic Site 2100 Cabot St. Sat. 10 am to 1 pm/

Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

Braddish Billings, the first permanent settler of Gloucester Township, built Ottawa's oldest wood-frame house from 1827-1829. Learn about the evolution of the property, and explore the history of water in Ottawa from the Champlain Sea to 19th century mineral spring spas with a new exhibition. W, P, F, B, T, OCT.

14. Britannia Yacht Club 2777 Cassels St. (North side of Tennis Courts at the end of Cassels St.)

Sat. CLOSED/Sun. 10 am to 4 pm Established in 1887, the renovated clubhouse boasts the beautiful Dragon Lounge where visitors can see a unique bar fashioned out of a dragon sailboat. It offers one of the best views of the Ottawa River enjoyed by members year round, and is available to host private weddings and events. W, A, P, F, OCT.

BYTOWN MUSEUM: Commissariat Building Canal Lane Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

Discover the secrets hidden within Ottawa's oldest stone building, the Commissariat, home of the BYTOWN MUSEUM! Learn about this spectacular heritage building from the foundation to the rafters, the vault, and stories of its former uses and inhabitants 192 years later. W, A, F, B, T, S, OCT.

16. Canada Council Art Bank 921 St. Laurent Blvd.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED The Canada Council Art Bank is home to over 17,000 contemporary Canadian artworks. Enjoy a behind-the-scenes tour of the Art Bank with art experts and view a thematic display of artworks related to the creative work we do at home, and the creative ways artists reimagine the home. W, A, P, F, B, OCT.

Canadian Conservation Institute 1030 Innes Rd.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED

Discover the fascinating world of heritage conservation and conservation science! Learn how the Institute supports museums, archives, and historic sites of Canada in conserving heritage collections so they can be accessed by current and future generations. W, A, P, F, B, OCT.

18. Canadian Guide Dogs for the Blind National Training Centre

4120 Rideau Valley Drive N., Manotick

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED Opened in Manotick in 1988, the property includes a residence building, where blind or visually impaired individuals live for a 25-day training course to bond and train with their guide dog. There is also a kennel, where 20 to 30 dogs reside while in formal training. W, A, P, F, B, T.

19. Canadian Space Services 2336 Craig's Side Rd., Carp Sat. CLOSED/Sun. 10 am to 4 pm In 1960, this satellite communications (SATCOM) station was built and used between NATO countries until 1999. A 68-ft. diameter metal space frame radar dome sits on the roof providing protection for the SATCOM antenna it houses. It is now headquarters for the Canadian Space Services Ltd., CSS Wind Inc., and Rocky Mountain Equipment Ltd. W, A, P, F, B, T.

20. Canmet Bells Corners Research Complex 1 Haanel Dr.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED Peek into pilot-scale facilities that are priming the Canadian market for a green future based on clean fossil fuels, bioenergy, green mining, and renewables, which are improving oil sands extraction,

steelmaking, transportation fuels, and more! Closed shoes required. Restricted access. Minors must be accompanied by an adult. No photos, video, or smoking. W, A, P, F, B.

21. Carleton Immersive Media Studio (CIMS)

1125 Colonel By Dr., Visualization and Simulation Building

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED Carleton Immersive Media Studio (CIMS) is a Carleton University research centre that develops innovative, hybrid applications of digital technologies for architectural rehabilitation and conservation. The work engages technologies that connect digital acquisition, building information modelling, simulation and fabrication. W, A, F, B, \$P, T, OCT.

22. Carleton Masonic Lodge 465 A.F.A.M 3704 Carp Rd.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED Originally built in 1904, the first lodge was destroyed in 1920 by the great fire in Carp. The lodge today, which had once been Carp's Presbyterian Church, was purchased in 1925 to replace it. Accentuated by original stained glass windows, the interior features beautiful oak furniture used by a military Masonic Lodge in France during the WWI. W, A, P, F, B, T.

23. Carp Exhibit Hall 3790 Carp Rd., Carp Sat. 8 am to 1 pm/Sun. CLOSED

The red painted frame building with white trim remains a focal point in the Carp area. One of the few remaining octagonal fairground buildings once so popular in Ontario, it continues to function as the main hall for the Carp Fair, and the popular Carp Farmers' Market. W, A, P, F, B.

24. Christ Church Bells Corners Chapel & Cemetery

3861 Old Richmond Rd. Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED

The Bells Corners Union Cemetery dates from 1853 and is located on land given by the community founder, Hugh Bell. In 1876, the Anglican congregation built the church, which is still in use today. Hear stories behind the stained glass, wood paneling and personages in the cemetery. After the guided tour, enjoy a Historical Strawberry Tea. W, A, P, F, B, T, OCT.

25. Christ Church Cathedral Ottawa414 Sparks St.

Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

The original parish, Christ Church Bytown, was established in 1832 on unceded Algonquin territory. In 1870, architect King Arnoldi was commissioned to build a bigger church in English Gothic style to harmonize with the new Parliament buildings. Named the Cathedral of the Diocese in 1897, it is often used for ecumenical, interfaith, and state events. W, A, P, F, B, T, S, OCT.

26. Christ the Saviour Orthodox Church 721 Somerset St. W

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED

A 3-domed Byzantine church, built in 1968. Most striking are the frescoes, the icons, and the nine ornate chandeliers. Special event @ 2:15 pm - A guided tour of the church and a sacred concert of a cappella Orthodox liturgical music by the church choir at 3 pm. Afterwards, enjoy a self-guided tour of the historic Holy Trinity church hall (a former firehall) built in 1913. W, A, P, F, \$P, T, S, OCT.

27. Church of St. Bartholomew 125 MacKay St.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED Founded in 1867, the heritage designated church was designed by architect

Thomas Seaton Scott on land donated by the estate of Thomas MacKay, founder of New Edinburgh. Discover artefacts about Canada's Governor Generals and the Governor General's Foot Guards. A, P, F, B, OCT.

28. City of Ottawa Archives, Rideau Branch

6581 Fourth Line Rd., North Gower Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

Rideau Archives, built in 1876, is a one-storey, brick-faced example of a modest hall with fine proportions, careful detailing and a cupola. The archival collection highlights material from southern rural Ottawa. The exhibit features the history of North Gower's main street as a part of a forthcoming history of the village. W, A, P, F, B.

29. CKCU FM - University Centre

1125 Colonel By Dr., Room 517, 5th Floor, University Centre Sat. 10 am to 4 pm /Sun. CLOSED CKCU is Canada's oldest campus community radio station. It broadcasts live 24 hours a day to a 100 km radius on FM 93.1 and around the world on ckcufm. com. Enjoy station tours with the hosts to learn about the world of radio. Buses and the O-Train stop on campus. It is also accessible via city bike paths. W, A, F, B, \$P, OCT.

30. Congregation Machzikei Hadas 2310 Virginia Dr.

Sat. CLOSED/Sun. 10 am to 4 pm In 1907, the congregation first began offering services in a Murray Street apartment. By 1973, it had permanently relocated to the Alta Vista area. In July 2019, it will celebrate 100 years since its incorporation. It's the first synagogue in the history of the Commonwealth to be granted a Coat of Arms. Please pre-register at www.cmhottawa.com/events. Photo ID is required at the door. W, A, P, F, B, T, R, OCT.

31. Connaught Building 555 MacKenzie Ave.

Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm Built in Modified Norman style and designed by David Ewart, Connaught opened in 1915. It was named after the Duke of Connaught, 3rd son of Queen Victoria and Governor General of Canada 1911 to 1916. Designated a Classified federal heritage building, the structure is considered the "Crown Jewel" of the Canada Revenue Agency. Access limited to the Mackenzie lobby and 8th flr boardroom. A, F, B, T, S, OCT.

32. Cumberland Heritage Village Museum 2940 Old Montreal Rd. Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

Visit historic and reproduction buildings on picturesque grounds that depict rural life in the 1920s and 1930s. Tour an operational sawmill, blacksmith shop, a one-room school house, a 1927 Imperial Gas garage, a 1904 church and family homes. Experience the new permanent exhibition, Dairy in the Interwar Period, at Taylor Barn! W, A, P, F, B, T.

33. Dickinson House 1127 Mill St., Manotick Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

Built in 1867 by M.K. Dickinson, founder of the village of Manotick, this 150-yearold house was the residence of the Dickinson, Spratt and Watson families, owner/ operators of the grist mill, from 1870 to 1972. The house was visited by Sir John A. Macdonald during the 1887 General Election. W, A, P, F, B, T.

34. Diefenbunker: Canada's Cold War Museum3929 Carp Rd.

Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

The Diefenbunker: Canada's Cold War Museum is a four-storey Cold War bunker built to protect the government from a nuclear attack. Once top-secret, this underground facility is now open yearround. Free 30-minute highlight tours in French and English by reservation only. Visit www.diefenbunker.ca in early May to reserve your space. W, A, P, F, T, R.

35. Discovery Centre, Carleton University

1125 Colonel By Dr., MacOdrum Library, 4th Floor

Sat. 12 pm to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED The Discovery Centre is a 9,500 sq ft collaborative workspace for undergraduate research. The dynamic learning environment is outfitted with ergonomic, accessible and stylish furniture, state-of-the-art technology, and three Library Laboratories (Gaming, Learning, Multi-Media) available for students and faculty. W, A, \$P, OCT.

36. Dominican University College 96 Empress Ave. Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/ Sun. 1 pm to 4 pm

The beautiful stone structure displays the vaulted ceilings typical of neo-Gothic design, and an interior courtyard opens onto elegant gardens. The highly reputed library is distinguished by stained glass, and the Wilson Room is dedicated to antiquated books dating back to the 15th century. W, A, P, F, B, T, S, OCT.

37. Dormition of the Virgin Mary Greek Orthodox Church

1315 Prince of Wales Dr. Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/ Sun. 10 am to 2 pm

Built in 1975, and designed by architect Konstantinos Zourdoumis in neo-Byzantine style with its domed structure. Highlights include hand-painted Byzantine icons on the domed ceiling and walls, hand-carved wood Iconostasion wall of icons in front of the Altar, and mosaic tiles. Services at 10 am on Sunday. W, A, P, F, B, T, OCT.

38. Earnscliffe, British High Commissioner's Official Residence

140 Sussex Dr.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED This National Historic Site of Canada is best known as the home of Canada's first Prime Minister, Sir John A. Macdonald. Built of local limestone between 1855 and 1857 by John MacKinnon, this Victorian manor has been home to successive British High Commissioners to Canada since 1930. W, F, S, OCT.


39. Embassy of Algeria, Fleck-Paterson House 500 Wilbrod St.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED Built in 1901 by J.R. Booth for his daughter, Gertrude Fleck, the house remained her private residence until her death in 1940. It was then purchased by Senator Norman Paterson, who resided there until his death in 1983. The house was bought by the Algerian Embassy in 2002 and is now used as a chancery. W, P, B, S, OCT.

40. Embassy of the Czech Republic

251 Cooper St.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED Construction dates back to 1879, and is typical of late Victorian vernacular architecture. In 1913 it was enlarged to twice its size, and by 1957, the Liberal Federation was using it as their headquarters. The University Club bought the property in 1970, and in 2000, it became the Czech Embassy. Portions of the building were carefully renovated in 2006. Guided tours on ground floor only. W, F, B, \$P, S, OCT.



41. Embassy of the Republic of Croatia229 Chapel St.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED

Known as Toller House, it was built in the Domestic Gothic Revival style by architects Henry Horsey and J. Sheard in 1875. The building was home to Frederic Toller, Auditor General of the Dominion's Currency in the 1880s, and in 1999 it became the Embassy of Croatia. Guided tours on ground level only. P, F, \$P, S, OCT.

42. Enriched Bread Artists 951 Gladstone Ave.

Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm Enriched Bread Artists is celebrating its 27th year in the former Standard Bread Company building. Opened in 1924, the building's plaque with the Latin proverb: Audaces Fortuna Juvat meaning Fortune Favours the Bold, can still be seen. It's now home to artists' studios continuing to sustain Ottawa. W, P, F, B, S, OCT.

43. Faculty of Medicine, University of Ottawa (Roger Guindon Hall - RGN) 451 Smyth Rd.

Sat. CLOSED/Sun. 10 am to 4 pm uOttawa's Faculty of Medicine is a leader in medical education and research since 1945. Roger Guindon Hall is home to physicians-in-training, scientists, and some of Canada's top biomedical researchers. Discover state-of-the-art research facilities, interactive workshops and hands-on science activities. Guided tours (EN and FR). W, A, B, T, OCT.

44. Fairfields Heritage House 3080 Richmond Rd. Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

Fairfields Heritage House, a 19th century Gothic revival farmhouse, was the first heritage property designated by the former municipality of Nepean. Five generations of the Bell family lived in the home, becoming successful in farming, law and political endeavours. Guided tours available. W, P, F, T, OCT.

45. First Baptist Church Ottawa

140 Laurier Ave. W. Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED (Sunday church service from 10:30 to 11:45 am)

Designed by James Mather in the Gothic Revival style, the cornerstone of the church was laid on July 26, 1877 by then PM Alexander Mackenzie. The church was designated a civic historic building in 1985. The sanctuary features interesting stained glass windows - one with an Ottawa Valley theme. W, A, B, \$P, T, S, OCT.

46. First Church of Christ, Scientist288 Metcalfe St.


Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm







103.Smart Apartment at Bruyère 75 Bruyère St.



Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED Bruyère is an academic health centre providing life changing care and research. Tour the on-site smart apartment and meet the researchers who are using new technologies to explore how to optimize health and quality of life for seniors. 104. Southminster United Church 15 Aylmer Ave. Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 2 pm

Designed by Ottawa architect J. Albert Ewart in the English Gothic Revival style, this landmark heritage building (1931) overlooks the Rideau Canal. The walls are Nepean sandstone and the roof is slate. The interior sanctuary has a high vaulted, wood panelled ceiling and a Casavant organ. W, A, P, F, B, OCT.

105.South Nepean Muslim Community (SNMC) 3020 Woodroffe Ave.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED

Built in Barrhaven between 2011 and 2014, the building has a unique architectural style that incorporates Eastern and Western culture. The centre caters to one of the most diverse Canadian Muslim communities – a multicultural community within the larger multicultural Canadian society. Visitors will need to remove their shoes in some areas. W, A, P, F, B, T, OCT.

106.Sri Sathya Sai Baba Spiritual Centre of Ottawa-Carleton 1694 Hunt Club Rd. (Entrance from Sable Ridge Dr.) Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED

The spiritual centre is a unique, non-denominational place of worship. Sathya Sai Baba's life message is to "love all, serve all" and "help ever, hurt never", strongly promoting the Unity of Faiths as depicted through symbols and messages on the centre's pillar. Designed by M. David Blakely, the 19,000 sq ft building was completed in 1997. W, A, P, F, B, T, OCT.

107.Stadacona Hall - Brunei High Commission 395 Laurier Ave. E. Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

The two-and-a-half-storey Gothic Revival style limestone home was built in 1871 for lumber magnate John A. Cameron. In 1882, Sir John A. and Lady MacDonald lived there before moving to Earnscliffe. It has also been home to the ambassadors of France and Belgium, and since 1996, it has been the High Commission of Brunei Darussalam. W, A, P, F, B, S, OCT.

108. Standard Bread Company, Gladstone Clayworks Co-operative 949B Gladstone Ave. Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm Built in 1924, the ground floor (east side) was converted into a pottery studio in 2003. The 1,800 sg ft co-operative studio

now accommodates 25 ceramic artists who work together, sharing their experience and skill. The public will view artists at work, and a variety of finished artwork in the adjoining gallery. W, P, F, B, T, S, OCT.

109.St. Albans Church 454 King Edward Ave. (Entrance from Daly Ave.)

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED Designed by Thomas Fuller, architect of the Houses of Parliament, St. Albans is one of the oldest churches in Ottawa. A recent renovation received an Award of Merit for heritage restoration, and provides space for parish activities, theatrical and concert events, and Centre 454, a community ministry. W, A, P, F, B, \$P, S, OCT.

110. St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church 82 Kent St. Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/ Sun. 1 pm to 4 pm (Sunday church service at 9:15 & 11 am)

In 1828, Thomas McKay built Bytown's first stone church on this site, purchased from Nicholas Sparks. In 1873, architect W.T. Thomas built the larger, more impressive Gothic Revival structure with a distinctive Reformation arrangement of pews around a high central pulpit, a beautiful vaulted ceiling, and lovely stained glass. W, A, P, F, T, S, OCT.

111. St. James Anglican Church Leitrim 4540 Bank St.

Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

Built in 1860, St. James is an historic rural wood frame Anglican church. Well known for its Christmas lighting display, it features a Horwood stained glass window circa 1880. On June 2 at 10:30 am, bring your pets and lawn chairs for a Blessing of the Animals Service. Next door, visit the Gloucester Historical Society and Museum. W, P, F, B, T, OCT.

112. St. John the Baptist Ukrainian Catholic Shrine 952 Green Valley Cres.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED St. John the Baptist Ukrainian Catholic Shrine is in the 18th century Ukrainian baroque style - a synthesis of European baroque and cruciform Byzantine-Ukrainian styles. It is designated a Shrine because it represents the Canadian Ukrainian Catholic community in the nation's capital, and is decorated with icons in the Byzantine style. W, A, P, F.

113. St. John the Evangelist Anglican Church 154 Somerset St. W. (at Elgin) Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED (Sunday church service at 8 am and 10:15 am)

Known as "The Church with the Open Door," St. John the Evangelist is a downtown Anglican parish that broadened its Elgin Street entrance to grow a caring community of those seeking God. Experience the beauty of this sacred space with its wooden arches and Warrior Chapel. W, A, P, F, B, \$P, S, OCT.

114. St. Mary's Anglican Church 2574 Sixth Line Rd., Dunrobin Sat. & Sun. 12 pm to 4 pm

New St. Mary's was built in 1909 after the Old St Mary's at Pinhey's Point, built in 1827, was deemed structurally unsafe. Many of the pews and other interior fixtures are from the Old St. Mary's Church, which was the first Anglican church in the Ottawa Diocese and is the oldest church in the Ottawa area. Ten stained glass windows. W, A, P, F, B, T.

115. St. Paul's-Eastern United Church

473 Cumberland St.

Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

St. Paul's-Eastern United Church is one of the oldest congregations in Ottawa. The Romanesque Revival church was built from 1888 to 1889 for St. Paul's Presbyterian Church by S.R. Badgley, architect. It originally had a large steeple. Unfortunately, the church was built on sand and the steeple had to be removed, leaving a more squat building. W, A, F, \$P, S, OCT.

116. St. Peter's Lutheran Church 400 Sparks St. Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/ Sun. 12 pm to 4 pm

Erected in 1952, and built of sandstone from Nepean, the space was designed by Cecil Burgess in the English Gothic Style. A Bell Carillon was installed in 2017, three swinging bells were installed in the tower in 2018, and the Casavant Organ was dedicated in 1977. Stained glass windows are the work of Russell Goodman & Sons, installed between 1985 and 1993. A, B, \$P, S, OCT.

117. Suntech Greenhouses Ltd. 5541 Doyle Rd., Manotick Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

In its four-acre greenhouse, Suntech hydroponically grows four varieties of tomatoes, as well as mini cucumbers. Come see the beauty of plants in full production; our tour will show you how we grow high-quality vegetables. Don't miss the tasting tables we offer! Bring the family and friends! W, A, P, F, B, T.

118. Supreme Court of Canada 301 Wellington St.

Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

(1939) The Court's distinguished presence is emphasized by its massive scale and commanding Grand Entrance Hall. Architect Ernest Cormier's Art Deco design enhances the natural beauty of the exquisite woods and marble interior. After delays during WWII, the Court took possession of the building in 1946. Only the Grand Entrance Hall and courtroom will be open. Photography restrictions. W, A, P, F, B, \$P, T, S, OCT.

119. The Loft Art Studios 951 Gladstone Ave., 3rd Floor Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

The Loft Art Studios is a collective of 18 artists who share studio space on the third floor of the former Standard Bread

Factory, erected in 1924. Artists have been creating within this space for the past 13 years. Explore the studios and discover a wide variety of artwork that includes painting, glasswork, weaving and textiles. W, P, F, B, S, OCT.

120.The Ottawa Mission 35 Waller St.

Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 3 pm

The Ottawa Mission (formerly the Union Mission for Men) was established in 1906 to help men experiencing homelessness. It has been at its current heritage location since 1912, providing shelter to 236 people each night, serving an average of 1,312 meals every day, and provides programs such as mental health, addiction treatment, primary care, job training and a hospice. W, A, F, \$P, T, S, OCT.

121.The Rectory Art House 179 Murray St.

Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

Built in the early 1890s, The Rectory Art House was formerly the Rectory of Saint Brigid's Church. Converted into artist studios and office space in June 2011, it now provides nine artists with private studio space and is the head office to Saint Brigid's Centre for the Arts. Please note it is not wheelchair accessible. W, F, B, \$P, S, OCT.

122. The Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada

774 Echo Dr.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED Located at 774 Echo Drive in Ottawa, Ont., this brick building was formerly the monastery of the Sisters Adorers of the Precious Blood. It was originally constructed in 1921, and the tall arches, striking stained glass and other key design features reflect this long history. W, A, P, F, T, OCT.

123.Thomson Hall o/a The Keg Manor

529 Richmond Rd.

Sat. CLOSED/Sun. 10 am to 3 pm

A Georgian style estate, it was built between 1831 and 1833 by William Thomson. A private residence until 1989, it has been occupied by The Keg Manor since

1999. To the east of the house, a walled garden dating back to 1833 served as a vegetable garden, which is now open to the public and cared for by the Friends of Maplelawn. W, A, P, F, \$P, OCT.

124. Trinity Anglican Church 1230 Bank St. Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

Designed by Ottawa architect L. Fennings Taylor, Trinity Anglican Church has occupied the corner of Cameron Ave. and Bank St. since 1926. Visitors are invited to view the unique stained-glass windows, especially the Great Resurrection Window installed in 1973, and learn about its exceptional pipe organ, built by Casavant Frères, dedicated in 1963. W, A, P, F, B, T, OCT.



125. University of Ottawa Skills and Simulation Centre 725 Parkdale Ave.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED The University of Ottawa Skills and Simulation Centre houses four state-ofthe-art simulation rooms including two operating rooms, one intensive care room, and a labour and delivery suite/ emergency room. Computer driven mannequins recreate patient care, providing hands-on training and experience. 126.Vanier Museopark 300 Des Pères Blancs Ave. Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

The Vanier Museopark was named because of its location in the Richelieu Park. The property called Richelieu Park belonged to the Society of Missionaries of Africa. They built an important seminary on the site in 1938. They also exploited the sugar bush nearby, which made way for the sugar shack to be built in 1998. W, A, P, F, B, T, OCT.

127.Vietnam House 85 Glebe Ave.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED Built in 1913, the house is a low, sprawling structure and was Noffke's first design in what was to become the architect's favorite idiom of Spanish-Colonial Revival. The house has been designated of heritage value by the City of Ottawa. B, OCT.

128.Wallis House 589 Rideau St.

Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm Wallis House is a designated Heritage building originally built as the Carleton County Protestant General Hospital in 1873. The hospital closed in 1924 and the building then had several uses until it was abandoned for several years. In 1994 restoration began, culminating in the successful completion of 47 high-end residential condominiums in 1996. T, S, OCT.

129.Watson's Mill 5525 Dickinson St., Manotick Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

Watson's Mill is a fully functioning grist and flour mill built in 1860 along the shores of the Rideau River. Come and explore Ottawa's only industrial heritage site to discover how the power of the river was harnessed and to dive deeper into the lives of the people who shaped Manotick, Ottawa and the nation. W, A, P, F, B.

130.Waupoos Foundation and Family Farm 2050 Rideau Rd.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED The land grant was awarded to Andrew Spratt in 1832. The farmhouse was built in 1891. In 1956, the Oblates purchased the property to use as a Novitiate. The Waupoos Foundation began leasing 200 acres of the property in 1980, adding cottages, lodge, chapel and pool in 1982. Today Waupoos continues its 40-year history of providing affordable vacations to low-income families. W, A, P, F, B, T.

131.Westboro Masonic Hall 430 Churchill Ave. N.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED Originally built in 1924 and situated in the heart of Westboro, the doors of the Westboro Masonic Hall have only been opened to the public for the past six years. Escorted tours of both the beautiful Victorian Banquet Hall and the Masonic Lodge Room will be conducted, with Masons from the various lodges on site to explain. P, T, OCT.
